

Lymphoma Canada (LC) continues to provide patients and families with resources to help them navigate the difficult journey they face with lymphoma. Programs and services such as education sessions, forums and webinars give patients and caregivers the information and support they need to help them cope with the changes a lymphoma diagnosis brings about and engage in their care and wellbeing.

ÉSTÉPHANIE'S STORY

Éstéphanie had just started university in September 2015, when her back started aching and she had trouble sleeping. Doctors recommended painkillers, but nothing helped. Shortly afterwards she happened to go to the hospital for a completely unrelated procedure. She showed nurses a lump on her neck ... and it began.

Scans were ordered. Then the diagnosis. Cancer, Stage IV. Hodgkin lymphoma.

'We've come a long way since the day we 'celebrated' her 17th birthday with the drip of her first chemo treatment. She responded well to treatment and today, Estéphanie is working part time and will restart school again soon.'

I want everyone to know more about Hodgkin lymphoma and have the best chance of survival. That's why I'm supporting Lymphoma Canada. Because their mission is education and awareness to the public and health care professionals, who are too often not aware how lymphoma presents in teens and young adults. PATIENT SUPPORT

Lymphoma Canada is committed to helping patients and their families access the care and support they need. As the only Canadian organization focused solely on lymphoma, we assist patients across the country through online and telephone support, peer to peer support, local support groups and by advocating for fair and equitable access to the best available therapies.

SUPPORTING ACCESS TO TREATMENTS

In 2015, Lymphoma Canada helped Canadian CLL patients gain access to a new and promising oral therapy. Lymphoma Canada's patient submission to the pan-Canadian Oncology Drug Review (pCODR) provided meaningful input from CLL patients around the world that led to provincial and territorial reimbursement of this important new lymphoma therapy

Lymphoma Canada continues to work collaboratively with other patient groups and cancer organizations to improve the affordability and accessibility of evidence-based treatments for all Canadians living with cancer.

PEER TO PEER SUPPORT

Lymphoma Canada's Peer Mentoring program was formalized at the beginning of 2015. This program

matches patients and caregivers with survivors whose experience in some way mirrors their own. Patients and caregivers are matched based on factors of their choosing, such as sub-type, treatment experiences, age, geography, family situation, and identified concerns. The program provides for both extended mentoring relationships as well as one-time interactions.

The Peer Mentoring program includes a full training program, and monitoring and support for mentors by Lymphoma Canada staff. To date, over **35 patients** and caregivers have received support through the program and **15 mentors** will have participated in the training program.

SOUTHWESTERN ONTARIO CHAPTER LAUNCHED

2015 saw the launch of our Southwestern Ontario Chapter, after a culmination of 7 years of activity. The chapter is in fact an expansion of the Waterloo Region Chapter, which saw a growing interest from the lymphoma community in the outlying areas to be part of their network. Created 6 years earlier, the Waterloo Region chapter had been meeting 4 times per year offering informational and support groups to its members.

HEALTHCARE PROFESSIONALS AND RESEARCH

RESEARCH

Lymphoma is the fifth most common cancer in Canada, and the leading cancer in teenagers and young adults. Research is urgently needed to improve our understanding of lymphoma, increase treatment options and move toward a cure. Medical advances are helping more patients respond to treatment and find a better quality of life. New treatments are reducing recurrences. We provide research fellowships to support these important efforts.



The 2015 Lymphoma Canada Research Fellowship was awarded to Dr. Kerry Savage, a medical oncologist and researcher at the British Columbia Cancer Agency.

Title: Gene expression profiling of peripheral T-cell lymphomas

Dr. Savage has a particular interest in T-cell lymphoma and is internationally

recognized as a clinical expert in this area. Her proposed research project focuses on peripheral T-cell lymphoma (PTLC) - a rare and aggressive type of non-Hodgkin's lymphoma that has a very poor prognosis. With poor survival rates, there is an urgent unmet need for novel drug design based on an understanding of the critical genes and pathways that operate in malignant T cells. Currently, oncogenic drivers in PTCLs and their functional significance are poorly understood. Dr. Savage's innovative experimental design has the capacity to elucidate the unknown molecular and cellular biology underlying these diseases, thereby providing the scientific basis for novel drug design.



The 2013 Lymphoma Canada Research Fellowship was awarded to McGill University Researcher Dr. Jerry Pelletier.

Title: Validating Tumor Suppressor Genes in Burkitt Lymphoma

Dr. Pelletier's research project focusses on characterizing the genetic mutations underlying Burkitt's lymphoma (BL), an aggressive type of non-Hodgkin lymphoma.

HEALTHCARE PROFESSIONAL EDUCATION

Lymphoma Canada is committed to supporting and educating healthcare providers in the diagnosis and treatment of lymphoma. With the recent development of numerous new treatment options that prolong survival with fewer of the toxic side-effects of conventional therapies, there is a need to determine how these therapies fit into the treatment landscape.


In Canada, there are no unified national guidelines for the treatment of newly diagnosed patients with lymphoma. While some provinces have their own guidelines, these vary from province to province and often base treatment choices on funding issues. Therefore, there is a need for evidence-based national treatment guidelines that are developed and supported by Canadian experts to ensure that patients with lymphoma have equal access to the best available care.

To advance the clinical mandate of standardizing lymphoma care across

Canada, LC and its Scientific Advisory Board (SAB) are developing evidence-based national guidelines for the treatment of all the major subtypes of lymphoma.

MEDPATH


2015 saw the launch of MEDPATH, an algorithm-based online tool that helps Canadian physicians and other health care professionals understand, adopt and apply the current Canadian Evidence-based Guideline for the First-line Treatment of Follicular Lymphoma in clinical practice. The MEDPATH synthesizes the Guideline into an easy-to-navigate visual map format that allows physicians to easily access the treatment recommendations and supporting evidence.


