BRITISH COLUMBIA

Current: Phase 4

General Population

- · Individuals 12 years & up
- AstraZeneca/COVISHIELD vaccine pharmacy program is paused, however if an appointment is scheduled it will not be cancelled



YUKON

Current: General Population

Individuals 12 years & up



NORTHWEST TERRITORIES

Current: General Population

- Second dose to adults 18 years & up
- Youth 12 years & older are eligible for Pfizer vaccine



NUNAVUT

Current: General Population

· Adults 18 years & up

ALBERTA

Current: Phase 3

General Population

- Individuals 12 years & up with first dose
- AstraZeneca vaccine for adults 30 years & up

*Note: Alberta is pausing giving first doses of AstraZeneca due to supply issues.



NEWFOUNDLAND & LABRADOR

Current: Phase 3

General Population

- Individuals 12 years & up
- AstraZeneca vaccine for adults 55-64 years



NOVA SCOTIA

Current: Phase 3

General Population

- Adults 20 years & up
- All Nova Scotians who did not receive the vaccine in earlier phases, including all professions and people with health conditions

*Note: Nova Scotia is pausing giving first doses of AstraZeneca over blood clotting concerns and increased supply of mRNA vaccines

SASKATCHEWAN

Current: Phase 2

General Population

- Individuals 12 years & up
- Second doses for those 80 years & up or received their first dose before Mar. 1
- AstraZeneca vaccine for adults 40 years & up
- School immunization program will be introduced in June for those aged 16-17 years



NEW BRUNSWICK

Current: Phase 2

General Population

- · Individuals 12 years & up
- First Nations 12 years & up Ages 12-17, Pfizer only
- Workers who regularly travel across the border
- Healthcare workers and regulated allied healthcare professionals
- Individuals with complex medical conditions
- Pregnant women
- First responders
- Residents & staff of communal settings
- Individuals who are housebound / unable to travel (with primary care provider referral)
- AstraZeneca vaccine for adults 55 years & up

MANITOBA

Current: General Population

General Population

- Adults 18 years & up
- Youth 12-17 years are eligible for Pfizer vaccine
- Second dose for people who received their first dose on or before Mar. 29
- Second dose for Indigenous people ages 12 years & up
- Second dose for individuals with priority conditions

*Note: Manitoba is adjusting its approach to giving first doses of AstraZeneca.



PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

Current: Phase 2

General Population

- Individuals 12 years & up
- Youths ages 12-15 will have the opportunity to get the vaccine at school starting June 4
- AstraZeneca vaccine for adults 55 years & up

ONTARIO

Current: Phase 3

Mass deliveries of vaccines

- Individuals 12 years & up
- Individuals in COVID-19 hot spot communities
- Individuals with at-risk chronic conditions and their caregivers
- Individuals who live in highrisk congregate settings
- Caregivers in select congregate care settings
- Essential frontline workers
- Individuals who cannot work from home (<u>Group 1</u> / <u>Group</u>
 2)
- Caregivers in select congregate care settings

*Note: Ontario is pausing use of AstraZeneca due to supply issues and out of caution for blood clotting conditions. It is reviewing data to consider using for second-dose.

QUEBEC

Current: Phase 3

General population

- Individuals 12 years & up
- Individuals 16 years & up who have a chronic illness.
- Targeted health and social services workers
- Individuals with a physical disability, intellectual disability or disorder of autism spectrum
- Workers of the health community and targeted social workers
- Essential workers in environments at high risk of outbreaks
- Pregnant women

*Note: Quebec is pausing giving first doses of AstraZeneca due to potential blood clotting concerns.



Canadian Restrictions by Jurisdiction – May 27, 2021













BRITISH COLUMBIA

- Indoor personal gatherings up to 5 visitors or 1 household.
- Outdoor social gatherings of up to 10 people.
- Indoor religious gatherings and worship services are currently being reviewed.
- Indoor funerals, weddings and baptism limited to max.
 10 people.
- Outdoor religious gatherings, worship services and funerals of up to 50 people.
- Retail businesses may remain open but must establish capacity limits based on 5 square metres between each customer.
- Indoor and outdoor dining for restaurants, pubs and bars may reopen with up to 6 people per table.

British Columbia is currently on Step 1 of its Restart Plan as of May 25. More details here.

ALBERTA

- No indoor social gatherings.
- Outdoor social gatherings up to 5 people.
- Weddings and funerals up to 10 people.
- Places of worship up 10 15 people.
 - Starting May 28, gathering limits will increase to 15% fire code capacity province-wide.
- 4 designated family / support persons indoors per LTC resident; outdoor social visits up to 10 people per resident.
- · Low case regions:
 - Outdoor social gatherings of up to 10 people.
 - Places of worship limited to 15% fire code occupancy.
 - · Funerals up to 20 people.
- Retail businesses and shopping malls at 10% fire code occupancy or a minimum of 5 customers.
 - Low case regions: 15% of fire code occupancy.
- Health, social and professional services may remain open by appointment only.
- Indoor and outdoor dining for restaurants, pubs, lounges and cafes are closed.

Alberta is moving into **Stage** 1 of its **Open for Summer Plan** on June 1. More details here.

SASKATCHEWAN

- No indoor social gatherings in private dwellings.
- Outdoor gatherings up to 10 people.
- Places of worship up to 30 people.
- Indoor banquets, conferences, wedding and funeral receptions in public venues are limited to 30 people.
 - In Regina and Area, banquet and conference facilities are closed.
- Restaurants may remain open.
 - No alcohol sales after 10 p.m.
 - Limited to seat four at a single table.
- Retail and personal services reduced to 50% capacity; large retail stores up to 25% capacity.

Saskatchewan is moving into Step 1 of its re-opening plan on May 30. Step 2 is expected to begin on June 20. More details <u>here</u>.

MANITOBA

- No indoor or outdoor social gatherings .
- Funerals and weddings up to 10 people.
- Places of worship must close.
- Retail stores must limit customer capacity to 10% or 100 people, whichever is lower.
 - Only one person per household can enter a business to purchase items (with exceptions).
- Shopping centres or malls have a capacity limits of up to 10% to a max of 100 people.
- Restaurants, bars and patios are closed for in-person dining.

ONTARIO

- · No indoor social gatherings.
- Outdoor social gatherings up to 5 people.
- Indoor and outdoor weddings, funerals and other religious services up to 10 people.
- Essential stores may remain open but must follow public health measures.
 - Non-essential retail stores may open for curbside pick and delivery only or by appointment.
 - Grocery stores, convenience stores and pharmacies at 25% capacity.
 - All other retail at 25% capacity.
- Restaurants, bars and other food and drink establishments are closed for indoor and outdoor dining.

Ontario released its three-step **Roadmap to Reopen**. The government expects to enter Step 1 the week of June 14. More details here.

QUEBEC

Restrictions by zones

- No indoor or outdoor social gatherings in residence.
 - Starting May 28, gatherings will be permitted on private land of members of two households or a max. of 8 people from different households.
- Funeral services and wedding ceremonies up to 25 people, except in Yellow Zones (up to 40 people).
- Places of worship up to 250 people in Yellow Zones;100 people in Orange Zones; 25 people in Red Zones.
- Businesses, stores and boutiques must limit to capacity of 1 customer per 20 square metres.
- Bars, taverns, and casinos are closed, except in Yellow Zones.
- Restaurants open for limited in-person dining except in Red Zones.

NUNAVUT

YUKON

- Unorganized social gatherings up to 10 people indoors and 50 people outdoors.
- Organized social gatherings up to 50 people indoors and 100 people outdoors.
- Funerals and weddings up to 50 people indoors and 100 people outdoors.
- Retail stores may open but needs an approved operational plan.
- Restaurants are open for indoor dining at full capacity.
- Bars, pubs and lounges at 50% capacity.

NORTHWEST TERRITORIES

- Indoor social gatherings in residence up to 5 additional people (to a maximum of 10 persons in house).
- Indoor public events up to 25 people.
- Outdoor public events up to 50 people.
- Indoor funerals are prohibited.
- Small outdoor funeral or burial service is permitted with up to 50 people.
- Faith-based gatherings up to 25 people.
- Retail stores may remain open but are restricted to gathering limits.
- Restaurants and bars may open for indoor dining up to 25 customer; Outdoor dining up to 50 people.

Igaluit:

- Indoor gatherings restricted to household, plus 5 additional people for emergencies only.
- Indoor gathering outside of dwelling restricted to 5 people only and gathering in community halls / conference space is prohibited.
- All bars must close, and food establishments may only open for takeout or delivery service only.

Rankin Inlet:

- Indoor gatherings restricted to household, plus 15 people.
- Outdoor gatherings up to 100 people.
- Community halls / conference spaces restricted to 50 or 50% capacity.
- Food establishments may open at 50% capacity.

Kinngait:

- Indoor gatherings restricted to household, plus 5 people.
- Outdoor gatherings up to 25 people.
- Community halls / conference spaces restricted to 50 or 50% capacity.
- All bars must close, and food establishments may only open for takeout or delivery service only.

Arctic Bay, Clyde River, Grise Fiord, Sanirajak, Igloolik, Kimmirut, Pangnirtung, Pond Inlet, Qikitarjuag,

- Resolute Bay, Sanikiluaq:
 Indoor gathering restricted to household plus 5 people. Indoor gathering outside of dwelling
- restricted to 10.Outdoor gatherings restricted to 25 people.
- Community halls / conference spaces restricted to 25 or 50% capacity.
- Food establishments may open at 50% capacity.

Kitikmeot, Chesterfield Inlet, Baker Lake, Coral Harbour, Naujaat, Whale Cove, and Arviat:

- Indoor gatherings restricted to household plus 15 people. Indoor gathering outside of dwelling restricted to 15.
- Outdoor gatherings up to 100 people.
- Community halls / conference spaces restricted to 100 or 75% capacity.
- Food establishments may open at 50% capacity.

Canadian Restrictions by Jurisdiction – May 27, 2021





- Informal gatherings limited to Steady20 contacts.
- Formal gatherings run by a recognized business or organizations up to 100 people.
- Weddings and funerals up to 100 people.
- Retail stores can open at reduced capacity to maintain physical distancing.
- Restaurants, bars and lounges can reopen for indoor dining at 50% capacity.

Northeast Coast and Central Region:

- No informal social gatherings.
- Weddings and funerals up to 10 people.
- Retail stores at 50% capacity.
- Restaurants, bars and lounges are closed for inperson dining.



NOVA SCOTIA

- Indoor and outdoor gatherings limited to households.
 - Two smaller households with 1-2 people in each household can gather.
- · No in-person faith gathering.
- Wedding ceremonies and funerals up to 5 people.
- Non-essential retail stores are closed.
- Essential retail can remain open at 25% capacity.
- Restaurants are closed for in-person dining, restricted to takeout, drive-thru, or delivery only.



NEW BRUNSWICK

- Steady15 contacts outside of household
- Indoor formal gathering of up to 50% facility capacity.
- Outdoor social gatherings up to 50 people.
- Faith venues can operate following Steady15 and 50% max capacity
- Business, retails, restaurants are open with COVID-19 operational plan.



PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

- Households can have indoor or outdoor gatherings of up to 10 people.
- Organized gathering, including religious gatherings, limits of 50 people – cannot occur in personal dwellings
- Essential services and allowable services may open.
- Remaining non-essential and non-allowable services only through delivery or pickup.
- Restaurants and bars can remain open, with in-person dining required to close at 12:00 a.m.
